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of God in Christ Jesus for You." (1 Thess 5:16-18)

Today's readings are mainly about prayer. They speak about perseverance in prayer, constancy in prayer and trust in God as we pray. In the first reading, Moses, after sending Joshua to fight against Amalek, is presented as making tireless intercession with constancy for the victory of Israel's army. Both Moses and the widow in today's Gospel story teach us how we should pray. In the second reading, St. Paul instructs Timothy to persevere in his ministry, to proclaim the word of God with persistence in all circumstances and to use it to "correct,

reprove and appeal with patience." By introducing the parable of the unjust judge and the persistent widow in today's Gospel, Jesus emphasizes the "necessity of praying always and not losing heart." Constancy in prayer is Faith in action. Jesus presents the widow in today's Gospel as a model of the trust and tenacity with which his disciples are to pray. The widow was asking for justice, something which God would certainly want for her.

The early Christians found themselves in such an apparently hopeless predicament. Soon after Jesus left them they found themselves persecuted and oppressed by the Jewish religious hierarchy. What encouraged them to endure the persecution was their belief that the Second Coming of the Lord Jesus was soon to take place. They believed it would coincide with the fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of the Temple. But when in AD 70 Jerusalem fell and the Temple was destroyed yet Jesus was nowhere to be seen, the Christians found themselves in a big crisis of faith. Have they hoped in vain? Will the Lord ever

come back to re-establish justice, to vindicate the innocent and put their enemies to shame? Should they continue hoping and resisting the injustice of their

oppressors or should they just join them since they can't beat them? In other words, the early Christians found themselves in the situation of this widow who, without her husband, her lord, had to wage a

campaign of passive resistance against injustice and oppression without knowing when it might come to an end. That is why the parable ends with the words of reassurance and a probing question: And will not God vindicate his elect, who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? I tell you; he will vindicate them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of man comes, will he find faith on earth?

There are two strong points to be noted about prayer from today's scripture readings. First of all, prayer has enormous power. And second to experience this enormous power of prayer one must persevere in prayer. Prayer has enormous power and it influences the outcome of events and it can change the lives of people. Commenting on the enormous power of prayer Nobel prize winner Dr. Alexis Carrel says: "Prayer is the most powerful form of energy one can generate. The influence of prayer on the human mind and body is as evident to us as secreting glands. Prayer is a force as real as gravity." The second point is that to experience the power of prayer we need to persevere in prayer. For example, today's first reading depicts the perseverance of Moses while he prayed to God. It is interesting to note that when he was tired, he persevered in prayer because he got help from others. We need to persevere in prayer as a believing community. That is why we gather together in the church as a believing community to celebrate Holy Eucharist. Besides this we need to persevere in prayer day to day, week to week month to month, just like the widow in the gospel did. For this we need to find a regular time for prayer in our daily living. We

live in a much fast-moving world where we are busy with many things and so if we do not find a regular time for prayer we may not pray at all.

So often we hear people complaining I have prayed and prayed but nothing happened. What could be the reason behind this? When we pray, most often, we desire and look for miraculous interventions and

immediate results. We should rather realise the fact that God hears us and answers us in his own time and in his own way. The subject matter of our prayer most often is our selfish interests and desires and so often our prayers are addressed to us rather than to God. If so, we need to question our attitude in prayer life. We should never consider prayer as a shortcut to achieve things that we may not have achieved otherwise.

Rather we need to look at prayer as a loving surrender to the will of God wherein with right disposition we

present ourselves to God, in all faith that what God wills in our lives will always lead to something good. Then we will know that it is easy to persevere in prayer when there is sunlight and thunder storms in life, when the path is straight and when the path ahead seems not very clear. Let us always remember the saying that the bend of the road is not the end of the road because we believe in a God who takes care of the little ones.


