Celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation

God has shown forth his mercy by reconciling the world to himself in Christ and by making peace for all things on earth and in heaven by the blood of Christ on the cross. The Son of God who became human lived among humans in order to free them from the slavery of sin and to call them out of darkness into God's marvellous light. Jesus, therefore, began his work on earth by preaching repentance and saying: "Turn away from sin and believe the good power" (Mark 1:15)

repentance and saying: "Turn away from sin and believe the good news" (Mark 1 :15).

This invitation to repentance, which had often been sounded by the prophets,

the voice of John the Baptist who came 'preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins' (Mark 1:4). Jesus, however, not only exhorted men to repentance so that they should abandon their sins and turn wholeheartedly to God, but he also welcomed sinners and reconciled them with God the almighty. Jesus died for our sins and rose again for our justification. Therefore, on the night he was

prepared the hearts of the Israelites for the coming of the Kingdom of God through

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betrayed and began his saving passion, he instituted the sacrifice of the new covenant in his blood for the forgiveness of sins. After his resurrection he sent the Holy Spirit upon the apostles, empowering them to forgive or retain sins and sending them forth to all peoples to preach repentance and the forgiveness of sins in his name. "Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you.' And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (John 20:21-23). Regardless of religious denomination, penance rituals are crucial parts of world history and human nature. The act of penance occurs in cultures and religions worldwide. Catholics seek absolution through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, which is an act of penance that involves a person confessing one's sins and receiving forgiveness for sins. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is one of the most unique and beautiful aspects of Catholicism. Jesus Christ, in His abundant love and mercy, established the Sacrament of Confession, so that we as sinners can obtain forgiveness for our sins and reconcile with God, with one another and with the Church. Lent is there to build the Church up to celebrating Easter. The Church has crafted the liturgical calendar such that the feast of Easter has an entire 40 days of preparation. Christ suffered and died for our sins in His Passion and then resurrected on Easter Sunday. We go to the cross in the confessional and rise again renewed after unloading our sins. Lent and confession go hand in hand in two ways. The former is the season of conversion, and the latter is one of the greatest means of conversion. Now that we are in the season of Lent, parish will be offering several opportunities to receive Sacrament of Reconciliation. common the lt's knowledge that many people have pretty much eliminated this sacrament from their lives; perhaps not consciously, but simply pushed it aside. Let's face it. It's not easy to admit our sins, and it's even harder to confess them to another person, even if it is a priest. In some ways it may seem a burden. And yet, to be truthful, there is hardly anything more adult and mature that we can do than face our own faults and sins. As difficult as this can be, it is one opportunity to ask ourselves how we have acted towards our families, spouses and those around us. While I might call myself a Catholic, have I done what I need to do in living my faith? The season of Lent was found to be more beneficial still as a season to stop and seriously reflect on 'where am I in my life? Am I turning away from sin? And am I turning toward God? Confession just very naturally fits into the season of Lent and the penitential season that it was always meant to be. As we as a parish community prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation let us begin to reflect on the importance of this sacrament in our lives and the meaning and purpose of this sacrament and how we celebrate it. The Triduum Is to the Liturgical Year as Sunday Is to the Week Joe Paprocki Lent



At a workshop he gave about the Triduum, Gabe Huck, a renowned liturgist said "The Triduum is to the liturgical year as Sunday is to the week." In Christian tradition, Sunday is a day "set apart" from the rest of the week, dedicated to worship, rest, and works of mercy. What Gabe Huck is suggesting, is that the Triduum, the "three days" beginning with Holy Thursday evening through to Easter Sunday evening—is to be a time that is "set apart" from the rest of the year so that we might fully enter into the Paschal Mystery of our Lord Jesus Christ. Granted, setting apart three days is not easy given our busy lives. However, we can still set apart these three days by entering into them with a different focus and attitude than we do on any other day through the year. We can turn off TVs and set aside social media. We can commit to being less talkative ourselves. We can fast from our regular diet – meals and drinks. We can make time to get to church for as many of the Triduum services as possible. We can pay closer attention to the needs of others.

As we move towards the Triduum services, check out the schedule for the three days—the climax of our liturgical year and the reason we are Christian!

Coronvirus Precautions New Archdiocesan Protocols

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Bishop Greg O'Kelly, after extensive medical consultation, has written to all parishes in the archdiocese regarding new protocols to be implemented as a precaution against the spread of Coronavirus. The following temporary protocols have been put into place in all parishes .

- 1. Cease distribution of Holy Communion by Chalice for the time being.
- 2. Cease distribution of Holy Communion on the tongue for the time being in order to avoid transfer of saliva.
- 3. All Ministers of Holy Communion will clean their hands with an alcohol based gel or rub before and after distributing Holy Communion, and avoid all skin to skin contact.
- 4. Avoid physical contact at the Sign of Peace for the time being.
- 5. Temporarily empty Holy Water stoops of water.
- 6. Alcohol based gels are available at the main entrance to the Church.
- 7. Anyone who has been in contact with a coronavirus affected place or person within the last 14 days and is experiencing cold or flu like symptoms, is to remain away from Mass till the symptoms have passed or they have been cleared by a doctor. Their Sunday Mass obligation will be met by a time of prayer at home.
- 8. Anyone using the kitchen is asked to wipe down the kitchen surfaces with disinfectant spray.
