On the Way to Calvary

This is the time of year we stop to remember and relive the events which brought about our redemption and salvation. What we commemorate and relive during this week is not just Jesus' dying and rising, but our own dying and rising in him, which will result in our healing, reconciliation, and redemption. Attentive participation in the Holy Week liturgy will deepen our relationship with God, increase our Faith and strengthen our lives as disciples of Jesus. We may not have a chance to be present in the church during this most important week. But let us be united in prayer as we celebrate this year's Holy Week. Let us also remember in our prayers those who are in struggle and strife due to the corona virus pandemic in various parts of the world.

On the Palm Sunday celebration, Jesus seems to be doing exactly what his disciples expect him to do; take charge, make a bold statement, enter Jerusalem as the Messiah that he is. The crowds in Jerusalem have swelled to several hundred thousand, crowding the streets of Jerusalem as pilgrims and residents of the city prepare for The Feast of Passover, the most memorable feast in the history of the Jewish people; for it is this Passover feast that commemorates God's deliverance of the nation from the slavery of Egypt. The prayer in Jesus' day was, of course, that God would free the Jews from the oppression of Rome. When Jesus comes riding into Jerusalem on the first day of Passover week, the crowds are looking for someone to rally around, someone to carry the banner of freedom and liberation for the Jewish people. But Jesus is not traveling the road to revolution; he is traveling the road to Calvary. And along the way several things happen.

On the Road to Calvary Jesus picks up some silent participants:

What different story would we be telling today if the unnamed owners of the donkey had refused to give it up? No matter how unknown a person is, he or she can still play a crucial role in the unfolding of God's plan. The Lord needs each one of us as he needed the unnamed owners of the donkey in the reading. A donkey was a very big thing in those days. The donkey was the equivalent of a car, a truck and a tractor all in one. You can see that giving up the donkey just because the Lord needed it was a very big sacrifice. It was a generous and heroic act of faith. And such a faith response is what is asked of each of us.

On the Road to Calvary, Jesus Picks up Some Admirers: Of course, not even the disciples comprehend that Jesus is heading toward his death by the end of the week. As Jesus rides into Jerusalem, the disciples are joyous, the crowd is energized, and shouts of "Hosanna" ring out. Yes, the crowds that sing and shout and follow him are admirers. They like that Jesus stands up to their own corrupt political leaders and religious figures. They like that Jesus seems to be a man of the people, that he eats with sinners and talks with prostitutes. They have been looking for a hero, and Jesus is the flavour of the day. And, of course, there were strange reports that he could heal people, feed people, and that when he prayed

What the crowds saw in Jesus was the son of Joseph, not the Son of God. They saw him as a revolutionary, not as Redeemer. In short, they admired Jesus because they thought he was the answer to all their problems. The admirers would walk only up to the cross and not upon the cross. All

admirers would run away when they have to follow him upon the cross. So, it's not any wonder that by the end of the week, those who admired Jesus on Sunday were shouting "Crucify him!" on Friday.

On the Road to Calvary, Jesus Picks Up Some

Opposition: In what is an otherwise jubilant scene of singing and shouting and celebration, the Pharisees hear all the commotion. Rushing toward the sounds of joy and laughter, they quickly size up the situation:

Jesus' followers are proclaiming him king! And just as quickly, the Pharisees shout out to Jesus, "Rebuke your disciples!" In other words, "Tell them to stop this

nonsense. You'll upset the Romans, and besides, you're no king or messiah." This, of course, is not the first time he has encountered opposition. Jesus has been opposed from the very beginning of his ministry:

- In Nazareth, at the synagogue crowd didn't like his interpretation of the prophet Isaiah;
- When he healed on the Sabbath, the Pharisees accused him of being a Sabbath-breaker;
- When he re-interpreted the Torah, the Law of Moses, they murmured against him;
- When he proclaimed that he would and rebuild the temple in 3-days, they tore their clothes and shouted in disapproval.

Opposition to Jesus is nothing new, and sadly, it is not going away either. There have always been, and will always be, those who oppose the work of God, who reject the love of God, and who ridicule the Son of God.

Most importantly on the Road to Calvary, Jesus Picked Up the Cross: Let's not forget that the road Jesus travelled led not just to Jerusalem, but through its streets where he was mocked and jeered. The road that Jesus walked was a road that did not end in the city. It continued out to the other side, through the city gates, to Calvary. We usually phrase it in the passive voice by saying "Jesus was crucified." And that is certainly true. The Passover crowd demanded it, Pilate confirmed it, and the Roman soldiers did it. They nailed Jesus to the cross. But if we say, "Jesus was crucified" or "They crucified Jesus" we miss the great significance of this week. Jesus picked up the cross willingly, sacrificially, and obediently. Paul says, "He became obedient unto death, even death on a cross." Jesus

said, "I lay down my life, and no one takes it from me." Today when we celebrate this Jesus let us place

ourselves into the scene where do we stand? Are we participating disciples who are willing to follow upon the cross or mere admirers who would follow only up to the cross? Let us ask the Lord to grant us the grace to be genuine followers that we may really find the true meaning of what we celebrate.

People struggling to cope with the chaos and fear surrounding COVID-19 can now access free phone counselling by appointment from Centacare Catholic Family Services.

In response to the health emergency, Centacare has increased capacity to provide telephone support for mental health concerns, family stress due to job loss, social isolation and other challenges arising from the coronavirus pandemic.

People do not need a mental health care plan to access the short-term support. Rather, they can phone Centacare direct and book an appointment for a telephone counselling consultation.

It is Finished: Good Friday

At three o'clock, Jesus said He was thirsty. A soldier fixed a sponge on a spear and held it up to His lips. He took it (John 19:30). Then, straining to raise His head and to look up to Heaven Jesus said "It is finished." Then he bowed His head and gave up His spirit.

<u>A perfect sacrifice of atonement is finished:</u> What Jesus really meant was that his job of saving the world had been completed by his offering of himself on the cross as a perfect sacrifice.

Reconciliation is accomplished: Sin had separated us from God, Jesus died on the cross to get rid of the power of sin to condemn us. "For God indeed was in Christ, reconciling the world to Himself" (2 Corinthians 5:19).

The ransom is paid:

"The Son of Man came ... to give his life as a ransom for many." The only way in which the satisfaction could be made for the debt we owed to Divine justice by our sin was by the Incarnation, willing, sacrificial death, and resurrection of a Redeemer who was both God and man.
