St Joseph: The Shadow of the heavenly Father

The Polish writer Jan Dobraczyński, in his book The Shadow of the Father, tells the story of Saint Joseph's life in the form of a novel. He uses the image of a shadow to define Joseph. In his relationship to Jesus, Joseph was the earthly shadow of the heavenly Father: he watched over him and protected him, never leaving him to go his own way. According to Pope Francis we can think of the words of Moses to Israel: "In the wilderness... you saw how the Lord your God carried you, just as one carries a child, all the way that you travelled" (Deut 1:31), (Apostolic letter *Patris Corde* by Pope Francis in the 150th anniversary of the proclamation of St Joseph as the patron of the universal church). In a similar way, Joseph acted as a father, in the image of the Heavenly Father for his whole life.

Fathers are not born, but made. A man does not become a father simply by bringing a child into the world, but by taking up the responsibility to care for that child. Whenever a man accepts responsibility for the life of another, in some way he becomes a father to that person. The Pope writes that "children today often seem orphans, lacking fathers. The Church too needs fathers. Saint Paul's words to the Corinthians remain timely: "Though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers" (1 Cor 4:15). Paul likewise calls the Galatians: "My little children, with whom I am again in travail until Christ be formed in you!" (4:19)."

Being a father entails introducing children to life and reality. Not holding them back, being overprotective or possessive, but rather making them capable of deciding for themselves, enjoying freedom and exploring new possibilities. Perhaps for this reason, Joseph is traditionally called a "most chaste" father. That title is not simply a sign of affection, but the summary of an attitude that is the opposite of possessiveness. Chastity is freedom from possessiveness in every sphere of one's

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life. "Only when love is chaste, is it truly love. A possessive love ultimately becomes dangerous: it imprisons, constricts and makes for misery. God himself loved humanity with a chaste love; he left us free even to go astray and set ourselves against him" (Apostolic letter Patris Corde by Pope Francis). The logic of love is always the logic of freedom, and Joseph knew how to love with extraordinary freedom. He never made himself the centre of things. He did not think of himself, but focused instead on the lives of Mary and Jesus.

Joseph found happiness not in mere self-sacrifice but in self-gift. We never see frustration in him rather we notice only trust. Joseph's patient silence was also his real expression of trust. Our world today, stands in need of fathers after the example of St Joseph. It does not require tyrants who would dictate to others. It discards those who confuse authority with authoritarianism, service with subjugation, dialogue with coercion, charity with a welfare mentality, power with destruction. Every true vocation is born of the gift of oneself, which is the fruit of mature sacrifice. St Joseph's vocation to fatherhood did not just stop at the level of making some sacrifice; but rather moved him to becoming a sign of the beauty and joy of love,

through the gift of himself to Mary and Jesus.

"When fathers refuse to live the lives of their children for them, new and unexpected vistas open up. Every child is the bearer of a unique mystery that can only be brought to light with the help of a father who respects that child's freedom. A father who realizes that he is most a father and educator at the point when he becomes "useless", when he sees that his child has become independent and can walk the paths of life unaccompanied. When he becomes like Joseph, who always knew that his child was not his own but had merely been entrusted to his care. In the end, this is what Jesus would have us understand when he says: "Call no man your father on earth, for you have one Father, who is in heaven" (Mt 23:9)" (Apostolic letter Patris Corde by Pope Francis).

While exercising his fatherhood Joseph always kept in mind that it has nothing to do with possession, but is rather a "sign" pointing to a greater fatherhood, to the Heavenly Father. St Joseph was a shadow of the Heavenly Father to Jesus and all fathers on earth need to be like St Joseph, a shadow of the heavenly Father. Jesus would have surely learned great lessons in life in his early age by observing and listening to St Joseph and those lessons he learned would have played a key role in his teaching and preaching ministry later.

The life of St Joseph should always be an inspiration for all of us, especially for all the earthly fathers to realize that they need to imitate the example of the Heavenly Father. (to be continued)


